

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A NOTE FROM THE CHAIR

The Covid-19 pandemic shaped the fall 2020 semester at GW, much as it disrupted most aspects of life around the world. Several of our faculty and many more of our students were affected by the virus, either by catching it or helping care for family members with it. Campus was closed for most faculty, students, and staff. Fall classes were all online, which required a few adjustments. I am used to seeing blank faces in my classes, but this semester I mostly saw blank screens on Zoom. Because of the disconnected nature of online classes, faculty had to find new ways of engaging with students, including new types of group projects, using discussion boards and Google Docs, and simply staying after class longer to talk with students. We will be online again in the spring, and then hopefully we will be back to in-person instruction in fall 2021.

Although how we did things changed considerably, what we did was surprisingly similar. Our students continued to do interesting internships (see pp. 3-5), albeit mostly online. Our alumni continued to have new achievements (see p. 6-8). We welcomed three new faculty (see pp. 9-10), although they have not been able to meet most of their new colleagues yet. Our faculty also continued to publish high profile and timely books and articles (see pp. 11), and received new grants to launch new research projects. For many of us, continuing to research and write was a welcome respite from the daily news. And several faculty took on new administrative duties to keep the Political Science Department and the Columbian College of Arts and Sciences running smoothly (see p. 12).

As 2020 draws to a close, I hope that 2021 will prove to be something closer to normal for us all.

Since January of 2020, I have had the pleasure of interning with the lobbying firm Thorn Run Partners. I never imagined that I would be crafting products for Fortune 500 clients and working alongside one of D.C's. most esteemed policy tracking operations as a college intern. Navigating health policy at TRP as the pandemic erupted, and continues to consume the nation, has been a pivotal factor in shaping my career goals. Throughout my time so far at TRP, I have experienced many amazing moments. However, my favorite memory formed a few weeks ago, when I accepted an offer to become TRP's newest Legislative Assistant upon my graduation in December!

At my internship, I conduct health care policy research and engage in TRP's policy tracking shop. I also watch Congressional hearings and craft memos and analysis for our clients, ranging from health care to financial services. I work on client deliverables every day, and I am fully integrated into the policy team. I've been remote since March, but my coworkers and I still manage to socialize (safely!) outside of work. It's the most challenging, demanding internship I have ever had, but I am learning so much and loving every second of it!

Michael Hankinson
Assistant Professor of Political Science
Areas of Expertise: American politics, political behavior, public opinion, state and local politics, public policy, inequality

What drew you to political science and your specialization?

I grew up where suburban sprawl devours farmland. From a young age, seeing the landscape change elicited a strong normative response—that this was a problem. As an undergraduate, I learned that what seemed like a local challenge was not only a political outcome, but one linked to political decisions made 50 miles away! This complexity and its unexpected consequences led me to pursue the politics of land use and housing.

What value do you find in studying political science during today's political climate?

Studying political science has helped me understand two valuable things. First, the political climate of today is not a given, but one constructed through decades of political choices. Second, we can use data to identify which policies and reforms would most improve the status quo. I find those two realizations uplifting even when the challenges of today seem insurmountable.

What are you reading for fun right now?

For inspiration, *The Warmth of Other Suns* by Isabel Wilkerson, and for relaxation, the *Broken Earth* trilogy by N.K. Jemisin.

What activity do you like to do outside of work?

Cycling. Every time I ride my bicycle, my day improves (p<.001).



Iris Malone
Assistant Professor of Political Science and International Affairs
Areas of Expertise: International security, terrorism, insurgency, civil war

What drew you to political science and your specialization?

I didn't set out to study political science. I was a Chemistry major in college. However, I was drawn to study political science because I took a leave of absence from college in 2007-2008 to work on Barack Obama's campaign. I worked as a volunteer for the primaries and then as a field organizer for the general. It was the most rewarding experience and I can't recommend similar opportunities highly enough for students.

When I returned to college after the campaign, I decided to major in political sci-

ence as well as Chemistry. I ended up getting interested in international security issues, in particular, after working as a research assistant for a professor on how dictators fight wars. I became interested in political instability, revolutions, and civil war after the Arab Spring broke out during my senior year of college. I had a professor who took over a lecture hall and was providing a continuous video stream of Al Jazeera. It was mesmerizing.

What is an unexpected positive of working in academia and what is a challenge?

A huge positive of working in academia is the freedom to research whatever you want. As a kid, having a special interest and obsessively learning everything about it could be a liability on the playground. As a professor, it's an asset. A challenge to academia – especially now – is making sure you get outside the ivory tower. I think it's important to have conversations with people outside your subfield and outside your discipline to make sure your research is meaningful and policy-relevant.

What activity do you like to do outside of work?

Running, hiking, backpacking, watching the Smithsonian's National Zoo - Giant Panda Cam.

What is your favorite Political movie or TV shows or Netflix binge-worthy series?

I really liked the TV show *Madame Secretary*. It's like if every *West Wing* episode was about International Relations. I used to work as the Research Director for the Office of Former Secretary Condoleezza Rice so it was really fun to imagine the Secretary's war stories being dramatized.

Assistant Professor of Political Science
Areas of Expertise: American politics, race and politics, political psychology, political behavior, voting behavior, experimental and survey methods

What courses are you teaching or will you be teaching at GW?

This semester I am teaching a graduate level course on Public Opinion and Political Psychology. In the spring, I will be teaching a new course called Harry Potter and the Politics of Social Identity (I'm very excited about this course!) and another graduate level course on Political Representation. In the coming semesters, I plan to offer a few courses on Race and Politics as well.

What can students at GW look forward to as they take your class?

Students can look forward to good conversations. I am fortunate enough to study a topic (race and politics) that is chronically salient in public discourse, but also seen as taboo in many instances as well. As a professor, I work to foster an environment that is respectful but pushes us to think beyond general conventions of how we should talk about race. So my class tend to be much more discussion based than lectures as I think they offer the ability for students to voice their own opinions while also hearing others' experiences.

What activity do you like to do outside of work?

I love the theater. So going to plays and musicals (remember when that was a thing?) is something that I enjoy doing when given the chance.


What is your favorite political movie or TV show?






